spring summer exhibition programme

Enzo Mari Curated by Hans Ulrich Obrist with Francesca Giacomelli 29 March–8 September 2024

We're delighted to be sharing the work of Italian designer Enzo Mari (1932-2020), a pioneering artist, critic, and theorist in this unmissable retrospective, which debuted at Triennale Milano in 2020. Mari was known for his work in the fields of industrial design, furniture design and graphic design, and his enduring legacy is evident in the artists and designers he continues to inspire today. The exhibition, curated by Hans Ulrich Obrist with Francesca Giacomelli, features a selection of about 250 of Mari's projects from a prolific 60-year career.

The exhibition will bring together furniture, children's books and games, product and graphic design, alongside more conceptual installation-based works. Upstairs, we will celebrate Mari's continuing influence on the designers of today with a display titled *Grazie Enzo: Contemporary Responses to Enzo Mari*, featuring a selection of invited designers, including Jasper Morrison, Rio Kobayashi and Martino Gamper.



Barbie®: The Exhibition 5 July 2024– 23 February 2025

This major new exhibition, developed in collaboration with Mattel, Inc., will explore the design evolution of one of the world's most famous dolls, Barbie®. Barbie is one of the most recognisable brands on the planet and her story evolves with each new generation. The show will map the Barbie legacy, starting in 1959 when Ruth Handler created Barbie to craft a different narrative for her daughter, Barbara; through to the present day, coinciding with the 65th anniversary of the iconic doll. The exhibition will delve into the story of the cultural icon through a design lens, with a survey of the fashion, furniture, vehicles and architecture that shaped Barbie's world. Through our partnership with Mattel, Inc., we have enjoyed special access to the extensive Barbie archives in California, presenting an exclusive opportunity to see dozens of rare and unique items up close.

Studio Visit Anthony Caro Centre Wednesday 15 May 18.30–20.00

Anthony Caro (1924-2013) achieved international recognition as one of the world's leading sculptors during a career that spanned six decades. His work is characterised by abstract forms made from found industrial objects. Join us for a drinks reception and a tour of Caro's former studio in Camden, hosted by his grandson, Ben Caro. Ben runs the centre and is Director of the Estate of Anthony Caro, with responsibility for storing, conserving and lending works in its collection, as well as housing the artist's archive and library. Join us to celebrate the opening of *Barbie®: The Exhibition* before it opens to the public, at a reception hosted by museum Director and Chief Executive, Tim Marlow.

Explore this blockbuster exhibition before anyone else and immerse yourself in Barbie's world for an evening of escapism, pink dress code optional! The show invites you to discover the story of Barbie through a design lens, exploring the fashion, architecture, furniture and vehicle design that brings her world to life.

Curated by Design Museum Curator Danielle Thom, the exhibition offers exclusive access to dozens of rare and unique items alongside other key loans and acquisitions that tell the story of the iconic brand over the past 65 years.

a message from our Conran Foundation Chief Curator

It's now four months since I joined the Design Museum as its new Conran Foundation Chief Curator. Time has flown by, with the museum hosting some fantastic events celebrating the power of design to transform and engage, including a sold-out talk with set designer and artist Es Devlin and the opening of the Saltzman Prize display, dedicated to this year's winner Attua Aparicio.

The Saltzman Prize, created by Lisa Saltzman to honour the legacy of Ralph Saltzman, nurtures the development of a designer's work at the start of their career. I was heading up the jury that selected Aparicio as the winner for her exploration of porcelain and borosilicate waste glass, which would otherwise end up in landfill. To hear more about Aparicio's design journey, join me for a conversation with Aparicio on 7 March in Museum's atrium, where the display will be open until 15 April. On 26 March we welcome the architect and designer Thomas Heatherwick to the museum for a conversation with me around his diverse practice and the release of his new book Humanise and the Radio 4 programme Building Soul.





Before coming to the Design Museum I was a curator at the V&A, looking after the collection of 20th and 21st Century furniture and product design. There I curated the new permanent gallery Design 1900-Now and launched Make Good: Rethinking Material Futures, a programme that looks at the sustainable use of natural and renewable materials in design and architecture. Prior to joining the V&A I founded the design journal Disegno, providing a vital platform for contemporary design debate. My work here at the Design Museum draws on both these aspects of my previous work: the curatorial and the editorial; championing new voices and anchoring them in design history: considering design's role in society and in building our futures.

There is ample opportunity to continue to explore and develop these interests at the Design Museum. While we are preparing to open three incredible exhibitions this year, showing the range and diversity of the design subject, it is my task to look forward to 2025 and beyond. In my role as Conran Foundation Chief Curator I will be shaping the future exhibition programme for the museum and I look forward to sharing more details in due course.

For now I wish to thank you all for your support and I hope to see you in person at one of our many upcoming events.

International news

We are very excited to share that Design Museum Director and Chief Executive Tim Marlow is curating an exhibition on the Italian graphic designer, advertising pioneer and painter Armando Testa at the Ca' Pesaro in Venice. Part of the city's official Biennale programme, the exhibition will run from 20.04.24 – 15.09.24.

The show will explore the creative genius that fuelled a career which began in 1937 and ended with Testa's death in 1992. His work is revered in Italy by numerous generations of consumers of everything from *Punt e Mes* vermouth to *Moto Guzzi* bikes but the range of his output, his visual acuity and his sense of humour remains largely unknown to the rest of the world. Equally important was Testa's training as a painter and his work as a teacher, including the young Michelangelo Pistoletto who later described Armando Testa as having 'traced the future of art'. If you are planning to be in Venice for Vernissage in April and would like to attend the exhibition preview, please do email us and we will arrange for you to receive an invitation.

To celebrate the exhibition, we will be arranging a special event for the Design Circle in June as part of a hosted trip to Venice. We look forward to sharing further details and a full itinerary with you soon.


